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President's Corner



Brothers and Sisters,

As the biennium is coming to a close, I find myself looking back at all that we have experienced and accomplished these past two years. In August of 2019, Grand Council and I started on an ambitious list of duties and deliverables in order to serve the fraternity, engage our members, and lead in a transparent way. Additionally, we were energized to crescendo towards our 100th anniversary of Kappa Epsilon's founding on May 13th, 2021.

The first year of the biennium started out the way it always does: with a period of acclimation to our new roles as Grand Council officers and exploring our relationships with each other. As we were becoming an efficient and effective team, I received a portent in the form of an email from my Emergency Department Code Bio Coordinator. The novel coronavirus had detected in the US. Like many, we didn't know what to do with this information. Looking back at my records, Kappa Epsilon started reviewing this issue seriously in early February. On March 10, 2020, Kappa Epsilon sent out its first instructional communication to support and protect our membership. We quickly tested our agility in situations such as potential new members sent home mid-education period, conducting meaningful and solemn initiations virtually, and supporting collegiate officer transitions.

KE leadership held several disaster response sessions. We immediately established that even one year of lost traditions, leadership, and recruitment put all of our collegiate chapters at risk. Therefore, our fraternity as a whole was at risk. It became obvious that if KE was to survive past our 100th anniversary, we'd have to come up with a game plan and quick! The honest truth was, some of our smaller chapters were already on the edge and without providing significant support there is still the chance that we could lose them. Of course, there was the additional worry of how to support our alumni in their personal and professional lives.

In that moment, I was never so grateful for my pharmacy training. As an emergency medicine pharmacist, I have had some experience in project managing a disaster. In disaster management,

there are four major steps: mitigation, preparation, response, and recovery. Finding ourselves in the situation, either by happenstance or luck KE already had some of the mitigation and preparedness tools needed to respond to the pandemic changes affecting our fraternity. In the recent years, we produced frequent social media and website/email updates, converted to live and on-demand webinars for education and chapter management, and had an approved budget from the Grand Chapter which allowed us to be nimble in our moves to continue providing programming while cutting administrative costs.

With the help of Grand Council, our executive office, and our newly appointed Grand Council Interns, we quickly set our response plans into motion. With conviction that I can only describe as above and beyond, we doubled down our efforts on supporting our chapters and members in any way we could think of. Each enacted response plan showed immense accountability and their efforts were quickly completed and published. I can safely say that working with this Grand Council is the proudest I have been to be a member of KE.

This is not to say we are out of the woods. The pandemic has done what we feared the most: a percentage of our collegiate members have gone inactive and has been a significant reduction in new member recruitment and alumni retention. The "recovery phase" of the pandemic is going

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to affect KE for at least the next 3-5 years, potentially longer, because the large majority of our revenue is from dues paying members.

This is the part of the story where I want to appeal to you to reflect on what KE has meant to you as a collegiate member or as an alum over the years. The relationships we have built, the leadership skills we have developed, and the purpose and mission that we vowed to support and keep are at risk of being lost to future potential generations of Kappa Epsilon members. Collegiate leaders, we know you are tired and we know you are doing your best. Please encourage your chapter to continue in its traditions and service to the college and community. Share your journey through pharmacy education and your spirit of service. Your efforts translate into what is your chapter's brand and reputation. This is what attracts and recruits likeminded potential new members to continue our legacy. Alumni, please consider renewing your alumni dues and challenge an inactive alum to come back by sharing all of the changes KE has enacted. Of course, we'd always welcome and appreciate your donations to the fraternity or the Foundation.

As I am writing this, we are creating our first, and hopefully last, virtual national convention. Reflective of the virtual nature of the conference, the registration fees are drastically reduced. We are hopeful that this will allow us to reach a broader audience of chapter leaders and alumni who have not recently been able to attend convention. As always, collegiate chapter management and recruitment skills are the major education focus for our collegiate attendees. We are encouraging collegiate chapters to register as many members as possible to attend our virtual conference so that they can aide in their chapter recovery once they return to

campus. For our joint sessions, we will be focusing on personal leadership in the face of adversity, optimizing the stages of a pharmacy career, finding joy in alternative pharmacy pathways, and highlighting how the spirit of service makes us better pharmacists, advocates, and team members. There will even be a little fun thrown in there too!

I have said this many times over the biennium, but please indulge me once again. I am so grateful for this opportunity to lead our fraternity and appreciative to each of you who have reached out to support me. I am especially indebted to our President Elect, Kristine Bryant, and our VP of Finance, Denise Schultz. The fraternity and I are so very lucky to have these loving and effective leaders on our side. I know they will continue to lead us into the next 100 years of KE.

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


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ALPHA RHO



Typically, a chapter would anticipate budgeting greater than \$2000 for two delegate members in convention attendance. In this model, chapters may be able to send at least five members for less than half of that cost. Chapters should consider sending additional officers or members, particularly those involved with recruitment and education of potential new members.

Despite the Spanish Influenza of 1918 – 1920 delaying the founding of our fraternity until 1921, Kappa Epsilon has persevered over the past 100 years! With virtual technology capabilities exploding due to the COVID-19 pandemic, KE has



been able to expand our services and content to our members. We look forward to embracing this virtual convention as our way of celebrating how far KE has come in 100 years!

Each collegiate chapter is required to send two delegates. Delegates CANNOT be Alumni on Rotation and CANNOT be swapped out. Whoever you choose to be the two delegates will be the voting members from your chapter, so please choose wisely who you would like to reflect your chapter's opinions. 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
