I am so very excited to work with this elected group of Grand Council officers to bring our membership a number of programs that will strengthen KE as we head into our 100th Anniversary! This biennium we are focusing on providing multiple avenues for members to engage on both local and national levels.

I'd like to share some of the work we have accomplished since convention.

- As requested, the convention materials such as PowerPoint slides and photos are now available on the website. The workshops, chapter management sessions, and other materials are stored in the Member Tools tab in the Member's Only Section. Feel free to share with your chapters and alumni friends!
- An advisor tool kit has been created and is posted under Member Tools tab.
- The collegiate Member Dues Report has been updated to reflect the changes voted on at convention and will help build KE's member database.
- The Chapter Planning Report has been streamlined to eliminate redundancy and cut down on reporting time. This report provides us data to show the status of chapters, their planning and leadership capabilities, and areas of support and resources they may need.
- Grand Council members have submitted their goals and deliverables and we are in the
 process of finalizing KE's initiatives for the biennium. This overarching plan focuses on
 providing active professional and service engagement, continuing to support the bond
 between KE members, and adhering to responsible financial budgeting.

At convention, several items of new business were shared with the Grand Chapter.

- The Regional Retreat Program (formally known as the Providence Program) had an extremely successful revitalization after four chapters stepped up and hosted events during a pilot in 2018. For this biennium, it was decided that the pilot be expanded and each region is responsible for hosting a Regional Retreat in 2020. Additionally, they were challenged to provide alumni programming for their local alumni.
- KE will be hosting live online Community Open Forums, KE Chats, twice annually. This is a new opportunity for members to interact with the Executive Office and Grand Council to share and communicate your concerns, ideas, and suggestions. The first Open Forum will be hosted in November and I am looking forward to the opportunity to give a live update on the status of the fraternity and then open up discussion to the needs of our membership. All prospective new members, collegiate members, alumni, and advisors are invited! Please join us on November 5, 2019 at 7 PM EST. Register to attend on the KE website.
- Kappa Epsilon is famous on our campuses for community service.
 Our members are committed professionals and provide awareness
 education and fundraising for our National Project, Breast and
 Ovarian Cancer. In past years, KE committed to financial support to
 national organizations that provide awareness and research. This
 biennium, our members have been given the challenge to create
 and execute service events during our "100 Acts of Service Week."





- In celebrating our 100th anniversary, we are asking KE members to join use during the designated weeks, one each in 2020 and 2021. If each collegiate chapter, alumni chapter, and alumni at large participate in at least one act of service during these designated weeks, we can achieve our goal of 100 Acts of Service! An act of service can be one hour or a whole week of service events. Everyone is encouraged to pick an event that they are passionate about whether that is our National Project, your chapter's secondary philanthropy, or your personal volunteering passion are encouraged to publicize their events in their communities and document their contributions on social media. Also, please send in your and pictures to the Executive Office. Get out there March 28 April 4, 2020 and be part of our national effort to make our campuses and communities a better place!
- KE hosted two national webinars last biennium. There has been resounding requests that this programming expand. Both live and on-demand webinars are being developed and scheduled with varying content with clinical topics, chapter management best practices, financial planning, and personal development. - Our new and improved website provides us the opportunity to develop a
 new program called "KE Circles". KE Circles will provide a platform for forumbased discussions for interactive mentorship regarding both personal and
 professional development. Topics will be determined based on need and
 available moderators. Both collegiate and alumni members are highly
 encouraged to check out this new program as we are growing its content. If

 Office or a Grand Council officer.

University of Montana | Missoula, M1

Greetings for the Delta chapter at the University of Montana! Three of our members in the Delta chapter, Emma Murter, Quinn Spinler, and Amanda Storkson, had the opportunity to experience an APPE rotation in Sukadana, Indonesia at the ASRI Clinic. This clinic is a part of the Alam Sehat Lestari Foundation in partnership with Health in Harmony. The town of Sukadana is located between the coast and the massive Mount Palung National Park, giving students a unique perspective on the operation of low-resource clinics. The ASRI Clinic not only focuses on the health of the patients it serves, but it also serves the purpose of teaching the patients, the community, and the world about planetary health, emphasizing that the planet's health is everyone's health.

ASRI has a unique pay system that is nearly unheard of in Western civilization. Along with the option of using cash or insurance plans to pay for their healthcare, patients trade handicrafts, manure, rice husks, seed/seedlings of native trees, or work at the clinic for payment. The resources and labor provided by the patients make it possible for ASRI to begin reclaiming and restoring some of the forest that was lost due to years of abuse.

Prior to ASRI Clinic and Health in Harmony's involvement in Sukadana, families were illegally logging in the National Park or were burning into the forest to allow more room to grow cash crops. Deforestation was creating dire consequences for the wildlife in the forest, including orangutans. Through the integration of the clinic's priority of the planet's health, ASRI has worked to plant seedlings in seriously deforested areas, inviting orangutans back to areas they abandoned ten years ago.







She began being involved as a member of the Board of Pharmacy in 2006 after her employer, Walmart Health and Wellness, sent a

letter to the Governor's Appointment Office recommending her through the high honor and praises she received from other Walmart pharmacists. She served as a member of the Texas State Board of Pharmacy for 12 years. She appointed to the office of President by Governor Rick Perry and held the position from 2010-2018.

Which KE Member has had the most impact in your life?

"The most influential KE during my professional career has been Gay Dodson. At the end of that three-year term I ran for a one-year term for Treasurer and then for a one year term of President-Elect with automatic progression to President and Chair of NABP and was fortunate enough to be elected."

Why should young leaders consider a future role in their states' Boards of Pharmacy?

"Young leaders should become involved in their state Board of Pharmacy to protect the citizens of their state and to educate their legislators when asked for a better understanding of pharmacy rules and regulations. Boards work hand-in-hand with their legislators and are available as resources when called upon by the legislators."

The Intersection of Two Great Pharmacy Organizations Part II Kappa Epsilon and the American Pharmacists Association



The American Pharmacist Association (APhA) (formerly the American Pharmaceutical Association) was founded in 1852. As the number of women pharmacists increased, they became involved in APhA and formed The Women's Section which existed between 1912 and 1922. Both women pharmacists and wives of pharmacists belonged. As a prominent pharmacy educator, Zada Mary Cooper was one of the women pharmacists involved. In 1917, the section formed a committee to discuss the issue of the women pharmacy students and the need for an organization to encourage and support them. Hence, those women were responsible for the formation of Kappa Epsilon in 1921.

The year of 1980 was a very special for Kappa Epsilon. Three members held major offices in APhA. President Mary Munson Runge, Honorary KE and Vanguard Award winner, holds two firsts for the organization. She was the first woman as well as the first African American to serve as President. In addition, Marjorie Moburg Coghill (Gamma), KE Key of Excellence winner, was the first woman to serve as Honorary President. Plus, Career Achievement and Vanguard winner, Lucinda Maine (Phi) was the president of Student APhA (now ASP). In order to celebrate these women, a special luncheon was held in their honor at the 1980 APhA meeting in Washington DC.
