CHAPTER UPDATES - OMICRON

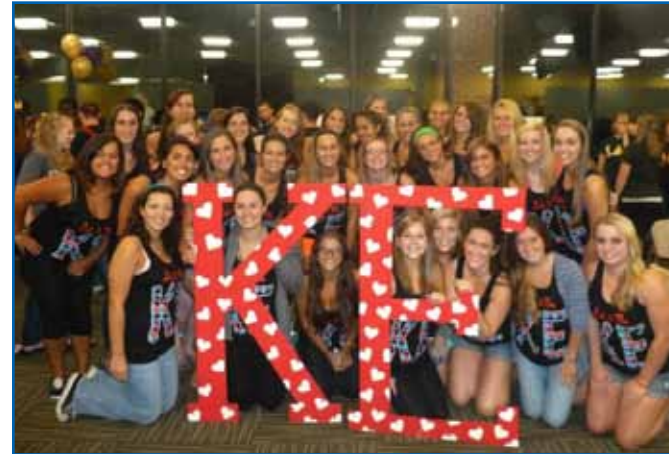

business stay afloat. We were able to donate \$100 worth of supplies to the shelter as well as a \$250 monetary donation in order to help them in their pet rescue efforts.

Eliza, who is now 4, was diagnosed with Sanfilippo Syndrome last year which is a metabolism disorder that will ultimately cause her organs to shutdown. This year was our most successful luncheon in our history! We had 181 guests, two speakers, and 55 donated baskets for raffle. Overall, we raised \$3,707 from the luncheon, breast cancer T-shirt sales, and basket donations. Our chapter decided to donate the money we raised to eight different national and local organizations, including Susan G. Komen Foundation and American Cancer Society. Some of the local donations included a women's shelter and Magee's Women Hospital. Our National Chair for the year, Jennifer Wood, put in a lot of work to make this year our best turnout! Throughout the month of October we also had a Pink-Out Day prayer service, a sister mass, a Breast Cancer Picnic, and pink hair extensions.

Another addition to our chapter is "Uni Points" for the pre-professionals. All freshman and sophomores awaiting an acceptance letter into the pharmacy program are allowed to attend all events and engage in service opportunities with the sisters. At each meeting, the pre-professionals

submit their "Uni Points," comparable to the sister's "Pedal Points." The pre-professional member with the highest amount of points gets a treat from the sisters! Our chapter also does a semi-formal dinner for the pre-professionals since they cannot attend formal. Last semester we had a night at the Cheesecake Factory. CINDY'S FIGHT

A Walk through the Valley of Cancer *by Cindy Baugh, Executive Director*

Unfortunately, there are seasons in life that present us with a life experience that we never anticipated. The Fall of 2013 delivered such a message to me with a diagnosis of uterine cancer. When given, what seems like an insurmountable challenge, we only have how we choose to walk through the journey to the end. And the advocates in our corner. Our family. Our friends. Our faith.

The morning of November 5th, they rolled me into the operating room awake and coherent. While scanning the operating room to identify the various machines, supplies and greet the Anesthetist and Scrub Tech (attending 3 long tables draped in green), I saw what resembled a huge metal spider raised against the ceiling. Among several thoughts were, "Oh my..., hope I make it."

My gaze and thoughts were redirected by the OR Nurse (in my face) and by the surgeon who grabbed my

hand to assure me where she would be during the surgery. I told the surgeon I would remember what she told me in Recovery, as I would be making efforts to awaken from anesthesia, coughing and moving my legs. As expected, I awoke to an emesis basin near my chin and a wet towel across my forehead. "I'm awake! Is the doctor here?" Immediately, the surgeon was

by my side giving me a review of her observations, "now, I don't have x-ray eyes, but I'm fairly certain that no more cancer exists—we got it all." With tears of joy, I proclaimed a victory shout. Everyone in the room agreed, "She's awake now!"

During my two nights recovering in the Cancer Unit at Research Medical Center, my heart was broken for the many who were suffering. Those bound to a bed with no hope. Likely to never hear a bird sing again, feel the wind on their face or enjoy the warmth of the sun. It was an intense experience that magnified the value of good health. Face down among tear-soaked sheets, I remembered each person with a hope of healing.

In December, I was blessed to receive the wonderful news that all the pathology reports were **NEGATIVE!!!!** Talk about relieved and

questions.” Weeks later, the exchange of a smile and a nod provided the answer to their unspoken inquiry. The kind understanding and assistance of the pharmacy staff will be forever remembered.

It is unfortunate that many lives have been interrupted and destroyed by cancer. Looking back, it’s a miracle that I survived. Not sure that I’ll ever appreciate having to go through that experience, as many people coin the phrase, “I’m glad I went through that—so now I know.” No, nadda, no siree, I think not. But this, I boost in confidence, KE is comprised of the most loving and dedicated people known

among healthcare professionals. I would not have fared so well without You, et al!! And that, My Friends, is the Absolute Truth. Stars in crowns, ordered and pending for all.

Mary Runge was a pioneer, role model, mentor, successful pharmacist, mother, wife, grandmother, gracious lady, hard worker and guest lecturer. These are only a few of the words to describe Mary who passed away on January 8, 2014. She graduated from Xavier University of Louisiana in 1948. After moving to California, she practiced hospital pharmacy for 21 years and then moved to a community practice where she helped poor African Americans who couldn't pay for their medicines. She retired in 1994. Mary held many offices in pharmacy organizations including president of the California Pharmacists Association and the California Society of Hospital Pharmacists. She became the first woman and first African American to be president of the American Pharmacists Association.

Mary became the fourth honorary member of Kappa Epsilon in 1978, having been sponsored by Alpha Nu Chapter. It is almost impossible to list all of her accomplishments. Mary was the recipient of numerous awards and honors including the Hugo Schafer Award from APhA, honorary Doctor of Science degree from the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, and honorary Doctor of Pharmacy degree from Ohio Northern University, just to name three. Mary was a woman who was willing to reach out and achieve. She opened so many doors for others to follow. She will be missed.



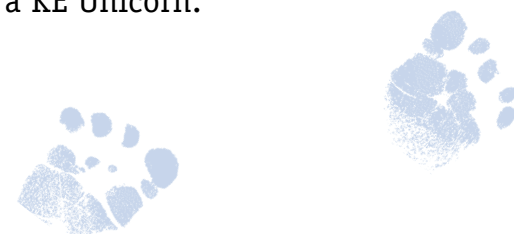
